¹⁴ Then we will no longer be infants, tossed back and forth by the waves, and blown here and there by every wind of teaching and by the cunning and craftiness of people in their deceitful scheming. ¹⁵ Instead, speaking the truth in love, we will grow to become in every respect the mature body of him who is the head, that is, Christ. ¹⁶ From him the whole body, joined and held together by every supporting ligament, grows and builds itself up in love, as each part does its work.

Church Tidbit – The Church (Building)

1882: Work was begun in the spring on the first M.E. Church, a 30 x 60 foot, frame brick veneered building with a tall steeple. Cost of the building was \$3,200. J.O. French, J.W. Maxwell, and W.J. Venemen were on the Building Committee. The first minister was Rev. W.C. Hall. The church served the needs of Maxwell Methodism until 1912, when the gratitude of the people for material and spiritual prosperity found voice for a new church.

1911: "Last Sunday about 1:30 p.m. the town in the vicinity of the.M.E. Church was thrown into an excited state by the cry of FIRE! In about ten minutes twenty-five men were on the spot each with a bucket of water with which the fire was soon put out. How the fire originated was a mystery as the fire was at the southeast corner of the belfry and 30 feet from either chimney. It shows the necessity of very careful watch over the building and chimneys."

1911 – 1913: Old church razed and work started on new church. From the time the old church was torn down until the new one was nearly finished, Sunday School, Epworth League and church services were held in the Opera House. The Opera House was located approximately where Casey's stood on Main Street between First and Second Streets.

<u>1913 – 1915</u>: New church completed at a cost of \$12,000. Pledges totaled \$5,000. The large stained glass mosaic, "The Good Shepherd," formed a large section of the south wall of the sanctuary. It is dedicated to a Maxwell pioneer, Joseph Warren Maxwell and his wife Marietta Pifer Maxwell.
